Rules

1. O.H.A. rules will apply.
2. Minor penalties will be 2 minutes in length. Major penalties will be 5 minutes in length. A player receiving two Major penalties in one game will be automatically suspended from that game.
3. Profanity, abuse, and heckling will not be tolerated and could mean minor or major penalties, at the discretion of the officials.
4. A maximum of 18 players will be allowed each team. There is no age limit. Players may play for only one team in the tournament.
5. Preliminary games will consist of 3 15-minute straight time periods. Ties will be broken by penalty shots by three players of each team.
6. Championship and Consolation Championship games will consist of 3 20-minute straight time periods with the last 5 minutes stop time.

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Dominion Ladies' Hockey Tournament 1967-68

Last year, at our first annual tournament, a total of 22 teams were entered. The following are the teams who won Championships and Consolation Championship:

This year, we again welcome back the champions and present a short note on each.

CANADETTES "A"

1963 saw the beginning of a girls' hockey team, sponsored in part by Litton Systems of Canada. With the able help of Roy Morris and Jim Tokiwa the team was entered in a local hockey league, the forerunner of the Central Ontario Ladies' Hockey Association. Scores weren't anything to be proud of but with extra practices and lots of hard work the team was ready to be entered in the Metro Toronto Girls' Hockey League several years later, where they finished with a creditable third place showing.

At the beginning of the 1967-68 season a new league under the name of the Central Ontario Ladies' Hockey Association was formed and again the Canadettes were entered. During that season they again finished third and lost out to Don Mills in the playoffs. The team attended many tournaments—Picton, Preston, Wallaceburg (where they were runners-up to North American Champion Preston Tri-anglettes) and the Dominion Championship (where they won the "A" Consolation Championship). This year the team won the Consolation Championship at Picton, Wallaceburg and Preston.

For the past two seasons the team has been unsponsored and each girl has been responsible for paying for her ice time, transportation, etc., but it is hoped that a sponsor will be found to help the team out and so enable the team to continue operating within the Canadettes Hockey Club.

CANADETTES "B"

In 1967 a dream of Jim Tokiwa and Roy Morris came true when a second girls' hockey team was formed and the Canadettes became known as the Canadettes Hockey Club. This second, or "B" team was to be used to train and develop players for the "A" team and under coach Reg Fukusaka and manager Garry Moore the team has done a very good job of achieving this purpose. Last year the team was not entered in a league and had to content themselves with playing exhibition games and entering tournaments. Entered in the Wallaceburg tournament in 1967-68 the team was beaten out in their second game by Don Mills by a score of 2-1 which was a very creditable score considering Don Mills is an "A" calibre club. At the Parry Sound tournament they were again beaten by Don Mills. The Preston tournament saw them go on to defeat Dundas to win the Consolation Championship and with the attaining of the Dominion Ladies' Hockey Championship "B" series their year was complete. This year, in a new league, the Southwestern Ontario Ladies' Hockey Association, the team has proven to be a strong contender and will also bear watching in their bid to win the "B" championship at the tournament for the second time in a row.

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THE MINI CANADETTES

This year the Canadettes started a new team designed to teach young girls how to play hockey with the idea that as these girls became older and more experienced they would advance through the organization and eventually play on the "A" team.

The "Minis", as they are called, range in age from 8 to 12 years of age. A lot of the girls have never played hockey before although there are a few who have played with their brothers in pick-up games. The team has ice at Rosalea Park Arena in Brampton on Sundays at 4:30 p.m. and at present have enough players to play practice games against each other. Next year we hope to have even more young players in order to eventually form a house league with regularly scheduled games.

MISSISSAUGA

In the fall of 1963 a girls' hockey team was formed under the guidance of Jim Brueles and Mabel Boyd. Playing games on an outdoor arena in Erindale plus exhibition games against Humberstone at High Park Arena greatly improved their skill. During the three years that followed, Jake Van Gelder became coach and Mabel Boyd returned to being an active player. Practices and games were switched to Nobleton Arena and later to Huron Park Arena. At this time Cooksville was entered in the old Central Ontario Ladies' Hockey League where they played quite creditably. Later they entered the Metro Girls' Hockey League. On their way to stardom they entered many tournaments and came out with a record of one Consolation Championship and narrowly losing another by shots on goal. During the Centennial year of 1967 the Cooksville team staged a very good one-day hockey tournament at Huron Park Arena. However, due to lack of players and sponsors the team was forced to close in 1967.

Back in 1966, while the senior team was still operating, a junior girls' league was formed at Huron Park Arena. With the guidance of Mabel Boyd, Wilma Duck, Flo Wright and Marg Poste two teams were formed and games played. Due to poor ice time and other coaches commitments, Mabel took the team over in 1967, playing exhibition games to keep the girls interested.

Borrowing boys' sweaters, "Cooksville", now "Mississauga" entered three tournaments: Keswiche, Alliston and the Dominion Championships. At Alliston, the girls showed that they were true sportsladies, playing five games between 12:00 noon and 7:30 p.m., losing out to Parry Sound, a more experienced team. At the Dominion Ladies' Hockey Championships with the defeating of Thornhill for the "C" Consolation Championship, their year was complete.

Through the years, Mabel Boyd has given everything one person can give to hockey time, energy, patience and, when the need arose, money. She is to be credited with keeping junior hockey alive in Mississauga and also providing players for the more advanced teams. It may be noted that most of the original Cooksville players now play on the Canadettes "B" team. So "C" teams better watch out, Mabel Boyd and Mississauga are out to win the "C" championship this time.

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BELLEVILLE

The 1967-68 season was the first one for the Belleville girls' hockey team coached by Bob Cook. Urged on by a number of girls whom he coached in softball, Bob was able to get enough girls to form two hockey teams, complete with sponsors. With the assistance of Bob Dafoe, Ralph Boomhower and Don Rushlow the team entered the Quinte League, and being unable to obtain ice in Belleville, played all their home games in Picton. The girls are all expected to pay \$1.00 per game to cover ice cost but even so, as in most clubs, money is scarce. At the beginning of this season, through lack of money, Mr. Cook lost all but six girls to more prosperous clubs but with the help of Mr. Rushlow he has been able to train enough new players in order to again enter the Quinte League. Able to play some of their home games in Belleville the team is now very competitive. Last year they entered four tournaments—Picton, Alliston, Keswick and the Dominion Championships and this year once again may prove to be the team to beat.

PITTS' PINETTES

The Pine Ridge "Pitts' Pinettes" hockey team had its beginning in 1963 in Cobourg. Known as the Cobourg Merchants the team went with nine players (three of these still play for the team—June Steed, Jean Bowen and Sylvia Hall; another former player, Teresa Gadbois, is now the manager) until 1967. In 1967, with the team ready to fold, Frank Pitts' Homes and Cottages consented to sponsor the team and the name was changed to Pitts' Pinettes. With Mr. Pitts' generous help the team was able to rebuild until it now consists of 20 players. During the 1967-68 season, under the able coaching of Harold Keely, the Pinettes won the Wm. McFarland trophy emblematic of the Quinte League championship (they were undefeated in league play) took the Consolation Trophy at the Ontario Championships held at Picton and also the "B" series Consolation Trophy here at the Dominion Championships. This year, stronger than ever, Pitts' Pinettes promise to be an exciting team to watch and a strong contender for a championship.

The opportunity to play this wonderful game is what the Canadettes Hockey Club is trying to make available to every girl that joins our club; from the 8-year-old beginner to the "old pro". Only through this "farm system" will a club find enough older players to keep a strong "A" team competitive. This has been proven many times by the N.H.L. and applies equally to all girls' hockey teams. Too many girls' hockey teams have "died" through lack of developed players or interested supporters.

So support your daughter, support her team — in exhibition games, league games or tournaments — no matter what kind of a game it is; for although she may never be as good as your son or any other male hockey player, you know she **is** having fun and that's what counts, no matter her age.

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Highlights

of the


Hockey Season

A number of ladies' hockey tournaments were held this year, evidence of a keen interest by the girls. One of the largest is the Lipstick Tournament put on by the Wallaceburg Kinette Club. Other tournaments were held in Picton, Beeton, Preston, and Keswick.

During the season girls' hockey was fortunate in obtaining wider recognition. On January 23 CHCH-TV televised part of a game between the Burlington Gazettes and Dundas Rangettes. Later, on January 29, for Minor Hockey Week, the Canadette "B" team and Dundas Rangettes played before a large crowd in Stoney Creek. A large number of people saw both of the fore-mentioned games and it is to be hoped that more and more people will realize that girls can play hockey and enjoy it.

Also during the season a new league was formed to accommodate some of the "B" category teams. This league, known as the Southwestern Ontario Ladies' Hockey Association, is comprised of Caledonia, Norwich, Dundas and Canadettes. It is hoped that soon it will be possible to form a Southeastern Ontario League and eventually have a province-wide organization. There are also leagues in Montreal, Michigan and an age-limit league playing in Doublerink Arena.

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
